





Scanning your Sources

- Obtain Books
- Scan Through Books
- Look For Common Themes
- What Issues are Heavily Focused On?
- What Argument Can Be Made from Research Materials?
 - This is Your Thesis

- Argument You're Attempting to Prove
- Uses Facts to Support your Argument
- Purpose of Your Essay
- Statement, not a Question
- Elaborated and Reinforced throughout Body of Paper
- Closing Argument for Thesis within Conclusion



Evaluating your Resources





- Print Sources (Books)
- Internet Sources
 - Use .EDU or .GOV
- Personal Opinions or Anecdotes
 - No Personal Experiences
- Let the Facts Speak for Themselves
 - Use Facts to Support Argument

- Reference Citations









Plagiarism

- Simply explaining that you have used someone else's work is not enough
- You must use citations to indicate where you have borrowed from another source



- Use Sparingly
- Always Explain Quotes
- Provide TransitionBetween Quote andNext Idea
- Make Sure Quote Supports Your Thesis
- Use Quotes to Liven-up Essay
- Don't Use Block Quotes





Taking Notes

Now

vs. Later

- Writing Introduction Helps Create Focus
- Weaker Transitions
- Less Varied Sources
- More Time Needed for Revisions
- Harder to Change
 Focus of Paper if Later
 Research Contradicts
 Argument (Thesis)

- More Organized Notes
- Stronger Transitions
- More Varied Sources
- Less Time Needed for Writing Paper
- Less Time Available for Revisions
- Easily Notice Missing Information
- Time Management Essential



Composing your Essay

- Thesis
 - Argument
- Introduction
 - Introduces Argument
 - Background Information
- Body
 - Attempts to Prove Argument
- Conclusion
 - Reinforces Earlier Points to "Sell" Argument



Considering Spelling, Grammar, and Flow

- Spelling/Grammar Check
- Using Transitions
- Preventing Run-Ons
- Don't Use 1st Person
- Past Tense vs. Present Tense



TOP TEN SPELLING PEEVES

- 1. "YOUR" AND "YOU'RE" ARE NOT THE SAME WORDS.
- 2. THE CONTRACTION OF "COULD HAVE" IS NOT SPELLED "COULD OF."
- 3. "THEN" SHOWS SEQUENCING OF EVENTS. "THAN" IS USED FOR COMPARISON.
- 4. MOST OF THE TIME, "AFFECT" IS A VERB, AND "EFFECT" IS A NOUN.
- 5. "THERE," "THEY'RE," AND "THEIR" ARE COMPLETELY DIFFERENT WORDS.
- 6. "TO," "TOO," AND "TWO" ARE ALSO COMPLETELY DIFFERENT WORDS.
- 7. D-E-F-I-N-I-T-E-L-Y-THERE IS DEFINITELY NO 'A' IN THAT WORD.
- 8. YOUR PANTS ARE "LOOSE." YOU "LOSE" YOUR KEYS.
- 9. YOU "BEAR" WEIGHT WITH YOUR "BARE" HANDS.
- 10. "A LOT" IS ALWAYS TWO WORDS.

Using Transitions

- Guides Reader from Idea to Idea
- Need to Connect Ideas:
 - President Nixon GrewUp Poor in California
 - He Chose to Resign from the Presidency in 1974

Richard Nixon Grew up in a Poor Family in the Midst of the Great Depression. Based on His Economic Standing, He Developed Social Anxiety that Made Him Paranoid. His Paranoid Behavior Led Him to Secretly Record Conversations in the White House that, when Revealed, Reflected Nixon's Attempt to Cover-up the Watergate Break-in. Rather than Face Impeachment, He Chose to Resign from the Presidency in August 1974.



About Commas


- Commas Don't Connect 2 Complete Sentences
- Comma Followed by Conjunction Connect Two Complete Sentences
- Without Conjunction, Use Semi-Colon to Connect Sentences
- Otherwise, Begin New Sentence

Run-on: There were no seats left, we had to stand in the back.

Correct: There were no seats left. we We had to stand in the back.

Comma Splice:

I am sleepy, I have to go to work.



Correction:

I am sleepy, but I have to go to work.



Jerome is feeling Funny about having to write about himself in the third person.

Stay Away from 1st Person



First person	I/me/my we/us/our
Second person	you/your
Third person	he/him/his she/her it/its they/them/their



- Refer to "United States"




- When Referring to

- Correct:
 - Ronald Reagan "Developed Great Communication Skills, which Made Him an Effective President
